

WYOMING COUNTY 4-H RECOGNITION NIGHT

WILLIAM & ALTHEA GOEWEY COMMUNITY SERVICE ACHIEVEMENT MEMORIAL AWARD

WYOMING COUNTY 4-H DOG AND HANDLER **ACHIEVEMENT AWARD**

The 4-H Dog and Handler Achievement Award, presented in memory of 4-H leader Pennie Smith, recognizes a participant who shows excellence, leadership, sportsmanship, and personal growth in the dog program.

This year's recipient is Logan Oyer of Fillmore. Over six years, Logan has advanced in obedience, rally obedience, and agility, earning strong scores and showing a consistently positive attitude. She is always willing to help at events and even tackled

the brace class for the first time this year. Logan's dedication and growth make her truly deserving of this award.



ERIKA TODD EQUINE ACHIEVEMENT MEMORIAL AWARD

The Erika Todd Equine Achievement Memorial Award, created in 2012 to honor 4-H member Erika Todd, recognizes outstanding participation and achievement in the 4-H horse program. This year's recipient is Jacklynn Crow of Strykersville.

A 10-year member of the Sidekicks 4-H Club, Jacklynn has competed in county and regional horse bowl, hippology, and many clinics. Skilled in multiple disciplines, she has represented Wyoming County at the NYS Fair six times and earned the High Point Rider Award for six straight years. She also rides with the Wyoming County Drill Team, serving as a Junior Coach, and has competed statewide, including at IEA Nationals.

4-H AGRICULTURAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD


Wyoming County Friend of 4-H Awards

Public presentations give 4-H members an excellent opportunity to research a subject, organize ideas in logical order, develop visual aids, and learn to speak effectively before groups. With each public presentation, there is an increas in self-confidence, poise, self-esteem, stage presence and knowledge. Public presentations can teach a 4-Her lifetime skills that will be useful in his or her future social, educational and career pursuits.

It is important for 4-H'ers to begin doing Public Presentations at an early age and continue throughout their 4-H career. Public speaking skills develop over time, with experience and repetition.

FOR HORSE PROJECT PRESENTATIONS

The 4-H Horse Communications contest is an event for qualifying youth to compete and show off communications and public speaking skills. The event is centered around the horse world, encompassing a wide variety of topics. Horse Communications is judged in conjunction with our presentation program. Please note on your event registration if you want to sign up for a HORSE PUBLIC PRESENTATION or HORSE COMMUNICATIONS. Options include individual presentations, team presentations, public speaking (no visuals), videotaped presentations and impromptu speaking. SELECTION PROCEDURE FOR DISTRICT PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS

Any member who is interested in being considered for District Public Presentations will need to indicate that on the registration form. Judges in other rooms may also encourage a 4-H member who gives an excellent presentation to be considered for district eligibility. At the conclusion of presentations, youth with the top scores as well as county judge endorsement will be invited to participate at the district event.

*Note: Western District Public Presentations will be held in Erie County March 28th!

PRESENTATION OPTIONS

All 4-H'ers have the opportunity to select one of six types of presentations. The choices are Demonstration, Formal Speech, Illustrated Talk, Recitation, Extemporaneous Speech or Dramatic Interpretation. What is the difference?







FORMAL SPEECH

The presenter aims to persuade, motivate, or inform the audience without the use of visuals. Proper use of note cards is acceptable. In this category, the presenter chooses and researches a topic of choice. Depending on the topic chosen, the presenter selects a format (persuasive, motivational, or informative) that best suits what is being conveyed to the audience. A Speech is written in the presenter's own words; however poetry, quotations, humor, or imagery may be incorporated to command attention or emphasize a point. (Recommended for ages 15-19, grades 10-12).

RECITATION

The presenter, with the use of vocal inflection and body language as communication tools, delivers his rendition of a piece of pre-written material. Props should not be used, but appropriate dress to subtly represent the character or mood of the written piece is acceptable. Dress should not overwhelm the oral presentation. Memorization is expected, but proper use of notes is permitted either in the form of note cards or a book. This area is not intended for presentation of original piece of material written by the presenter.

DRAMATIC INTERPRETATION

The presenter or team of two delivers a re-enactment of a piece of scripted material. The content can be taken from plays, movies, sketches, or monologues -- dramatic or comedic. This form of presentation, by definition, should include props and costumes. Propr need to be simple and minimal, not detracting from the strength of the presenter(s). Original pieces written by the presenter(s) are accepted in this category, but 4-H educators should monitor appropriateness of presentation.



NEW

EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEECH

Participants will select a topic for their speech by randomly drawing three questions/statements from a pool of topics. They will select one to present on. Topics will be relevant to today's youth and might include current events, 4-H, and other social issues. Youth will have 5 minutes to organize their speech. No two contestants will speak on the same question/statement in the same year. For senior participants only.



ILLUSTRATED TALK

The presenter uses visual aids to tell about the topic. The effective use of charts, pictures, posters, slides, PowerPoint Slides, overheads, graphs, examples, models, etc., plays a major role in communicating the presenter's message. (Recommended for ages 9 and up).



DEMONSTRATION

The presenter shows and explains how to do or make something (how to juggle, make a kite, make cookies, care for a 4-H project animal, etc.). Models or illustrations are used as needed to explain information, show the steps in the preocess being demonstrated, reveal finished products, etc. (Recommended for all ages).

TIPS FOR GOOD PRESENTING

PICK A TOPIC

That you like, That you know something about, That you want to share with others. That is 4-H appropriate.

PREPARE AN OUTLINE

Introduction - Greet your audience and get their attention and interest. Tell what you will be demonstrating and explain why you are interested in the topic.

Body - Present the facts and information in an orderly and logical sequence. Explain what you are doing and why.

Summary - Briefly restate main points of presentation. Give sources of information. Ask the audience if they have any questions.

PRACTICE-PRACTICE

So your show and tell will be smooth and natural.



PRESENT

Dress neatly; jeans and a nice shirt or slacks and a blouse are appropriate. Dress to impress! Food demonstrations should wear short sleeves, gloves and have hair pulled back in hair net, scarf or chef's hat.

Be sure everthing is in place before you begin.

Work quickly and neatly.

Look at the audience, not down at the demonstration table or your notes too often! Smile, relax, and enjoy what you are doing!

Speak naturally in a clear, loud voice so the audience can hear you.

GUIDELINES FOR PRESENTATION LENGTH

1st year presenter - 3-5 minutes 2nd year presenter - 5-7 minutes 3rd year and older - 7-15 minutes These are not strict rules, just guidelines!!

Note: No presentation should take longer than 15 minutes!!

Horse presenters trying to go to regionals: 9-12 minutes Horse team demonstrations: 10-15 minutes Horse public speaking competitors: 7-10 minutes Videotaped presentation: 20 to 30 minutes Impromptu speaking: 5 to 8 minutes




